

Local Political Coordinator PLAYBOOK







INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the Local Political Coordinator Playbook is to provide Local Boards/Associations with a template to create a Local Political Coordinator (LPC) Program. This Playbook will help LPCs learn their role and perform expected responsibilities successfully and effectively. This serves as a reference and list of best practices for the LPC community.

What is a Local Political Coordinator?

LPCs are selected REALTOR® members who play an important role in the grassroots and advocacy efforts of Missouri REALTORS® and the Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS®. Each LPC is matched with a local community leader (or leaders) or elected official with whom they will cultivate a relationship and educate on issues important to the real estate industry and private property rights.

Local Political Coordinator Requirements

The LPC is generally selected by the RPAC Committee and then confirmed by the Board of Directors. They are someone with a level of experience that allows them to successfully navigate political relationships and monitor municipal issues.

Your responsibility as a Local Political Coordinator is to provide a link between local business/government and Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS®. We want to hear from you about potential issues or actions in our region which impact homeowners, REALTORS®, or the real estate industry. Likewise, if we hear of something happening we would like your help in connecting with your local elected officials or community leaders.

The REALTOR® Party

The REALTOR® Party is the non-partisan approach to promoting legislation that is of importance to all REALTORS®. LPCs *must be able to remove their personal biases* on unrelated issues before advocating on any REALTOR® supported issue.

LPC DUTIES AND EXPECTATIONS

What is your job as a Local Political Coordinator?



Elected Official/Community Leader Relations

- Provide a critical link to ensure continued and consistent messaging to elected officials/community leaders in your city.
- Maintain positive, professional communication with them and meet with them regularly to stay connected and discuss key issues.
- Provide a critical link to ensure constant and consistent messaging from your RPAC Committee/MR to elected officials./community leaders.
- Meet with your official/leader three to four times a year.
- Invite your official/leader to appropriate local association events.

REALTOR® Connection

- Sign up for REALTOR® Party Mobile Text Alerts (text REALTORS to 30644).
- Respond to all Calls for Action and requests to contact your elected official.
- Attend government meetings, political events or other gatherings of interest to interact with your elected official/community leader.



HOW TO STAY INFORMED

- Monitor municipal meeting agendas and minutes so you can identify issues of interest to REALTORS®
- Visit the Advocacy section on missourirealtor.org
- Visit your local city/county government (or business) page(s)
- Visit your assigned elected official or community leader's website, "like" their Facebook page, and engage with them on social media

FOSTERING A RELATIONSHIP WITH YOUR OFFICIALS/LEADERS

There are many ways to maximize your infuence

- Work with your local Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS® staff or Missouri REALTOR® Party staff to plan and conduct a visit with your elected officials/community leaders.
- Get to know key staff members in your official/leader's office.
- Personally interact with and invite your official/community leader(s) in REALTOR® activities, including invitations to speak at your annual meeting, attend new office openings, groundbreakings, etc.
- Volunteer for a any campaign activities, including phone banking, canvassing or hosting a fundraiser (if applicable).
 This will add credibility to your grassroots messages and help to build lasting relationships with your local community leaders
- Consider making a personal political contribution (if applicable).
- Work with Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS® staff to learn about different opportunities to get in front of your community leader(s) such as in-district meetings and events.



- Work with Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS® staff to coordinate meetings and keep up to date on legislative issues.
- Deliver the main message clearly.

Begin with: "I'm calling you to urge you to vote for/against..."

End with: "Thank you for speaking with me and I hope you'll support the REALTOR® position and vote for/against..."

- Feel free to give the elected official/community leader a personal example, but be sure it's related to what the issue is about. If you are unsure that your message applies, check with Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS® staff.
- When speaking about a specific ordinance, include the ordinance number, what the topic is, what the ordinance does and specific reasons for our support or opposition.
- Ask if the elected official has any concerns/reservations and address them if you can.

You can always say: "Let me speak to Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS® staff and get back to you."

- Contact the elected official/community leader as soon as you can when needed/requested.
- Remember that it is very effective when the REALTOR® Party position is communicated by you—someone with whom the elected official or community leader has a relationship.
- · Listen to the elected official/community leader.




- Go off track...stick to the talking points.
- Commit to changing an ordinance or changing the Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS® position. We speak with one united voice.
 If an elected official has concerns or objections, get that information to Ozark Gateway Association of REALTORS® staff immediately.
- Make promises about rewards for the "right" vote or threats of retribution.
- Wait too long to contact the legislator. Due to the large number of issues being considered, action can occur quickly.

DO NOT MENTION RPAC TO AN ELECTED OFFICIAL WHEN SPEAKING ABOUT LEGISLATION. DO NOT MENTION RPAC WHEN IN AN ELECTED OFFICIAL'S GOVERNMENT OFFICE.
